
Commodore's Comments New Members, New Ideas, Familiar Interests

New members are bringing a refreshing vitality to the SIYC. This month we welcomed Rusty and Taunya, with Terry and Charing and Alicia and Ray soon be inducted. Our new members have been actively participating in Club activities. Most are early in their cruising preparation and eager to learn. This puts a different slant on our programs—topics that seem old hat to some of the saltier members are new and interesting to the less experienced cruisers.

I have been looking over the survey results. 25 people have responded and I reopened the survey to let the new and soon-to-be members add their responses. Although the answers are mostly what I expected, there are some nuggets worth mining. (All full analysis will be sent in the next few weeks.) While most of our members have greater than 10 years sailing experience and 52% have made extended passages, a full 44% have sailed primarily on inland waters. Interest in cruising stories and sailing technique talks was very strong. The basic mix of programs seems to be about right. There were many excellent suggestions for growing the club's membership which we will be exploring in the months to come. But when asked about interest in participating in SIYC committees and being officers, the responses ranged from lukewarm to "not a chance." The newest members don't feel knowledgeable enough about the SIYC to be officers, which is reasonable. They can help out a lot by lending a hand with committee assignments. For example, the Vice-Commodore would love to have assistance in finding program speakers. Hopefully more involvement in Club activities will help produce tomorrow's new officers.

New Members: Rusty Gesner & Taunya Coutts



New members Rusty Gesner and Taunya Coutts have been together for 5+ years. They have 6 children total. Rusty's Rick and Alicia, and Taunya's Lara are adults. Taunya's Linnea (8), Annika (14) and Fiona (7) live with Rusty & Taunya half time. They have varying interest in sailing, so you may meet them at SIYC events - they are outgoing and enjoy a party.

Taunya left a sales and administrative career to return to college during the economic downturn, and will receive a BS in Biology (with a marine/tropical focus) this Spring. Rusty is the world's longest term AutoCAD user (since 1982), author/editor of 20+ CAD books, a Licensed Architect (WA), and since 1997 has managed the CAD/BIM software systems and users at Mackenzie (www.mcknze.com), a leading NW regional architectural and engineering firm.

One of the things that drew them together was a sense of adventure. Taunya has always desired to visit and even live in exotic (especially tropical) places, and a trip to Belize convinced Rusty that tropical adventure was something he definitely wanted more of as well.

In several years, after Taunya receives her Masters or PhD and Rusty retires, they were thinking to do some international travel. When some cruising friends inspired them to investigate what it would be like to cruise the world, they realized that it fit into everything they want to do.

Rusty crewed on his younger brother's Flying Dutchman in Midwest regattas and in the 1974 Nationals (second place in junior class and B fleet). Then, boatless, he resorted to biking, skiing (15+ years in Mt Hood Ski Patrol), and kayaking for recreation until June 2012, when they bought their 1992 Macgregor 26S (the classic, real sailboat, not the new Mac 26 motor-sailor). Rusty spends much time researching sailboats and cruising, mining blogs and forums for technical information and to learn from others experiences. Taunya took a term abroad at www.sea.org, doing science research while learning to crew a 135' brigantine. With four weeks sailing through the Sargasso sea, she learned how to navigate by chart and sextant and loved her bluewater time.

Their 6-7 year plan is to finish renovating their house, complete degree(s) (Taunya), buy their bluewater boat and bring it here to refit and practice sailing it, retire (Rusty) and sail away. The kids will come with them - and have the opportunity to experience and grow in a way many their age never will.

They named their boat "On a Whim" because they weren't planning to buy it for a couple of years, however it was one of those seems-too-good-to-be-true deals. The original owners had kept this 1992 boat garaged for 18 years, taking it out only for a week's vacation each year. It looked like new and the 20 year old Honda only had 120 hours on it!. Rusty and Taunya chose this type of boat because its water-ballasted design and kick-up rudder and centerboard gives it a shoal draft or 16" and makes it easily trailerable. In addition to cruising the Columbia, they plan to take it to Puget Sound and the San Juan Islands.

Rusty and Taunya say they're really excited to be new members of SIYC, because they feel it will help them grow and live their cruising dreams.



Recipe of the Month: Pickled Fish

Last month, I shared with you a yogurt recipe for when you're very far away from any cartons of milk. Like this month's recipe, it came from my friend, Iretta. We met Steve and Iretta in a remote lagoon in the Tuamotus. We were there a week, and every day there was a new treat from Iretta's galley.



This pickled fish is a great hors d'oeuvre. It's a great way to deal with too much fish and no way to store it: serve it to your neighbors. Besides, it keeps, and gets more delicious for a few days if you have space in your refrigerator.

Iretta had great stores of whole spices which she used liberally in her recipes. Some of them are listed in this recipe, but she encouraged me to add any whole spices I felt like. She was unwilling to specify amounts, but leaves it all up to the cook.

½ cup water or orange juice
½ cup vinegar
2/3 cup chicken or fish broth
2-3 cloves of garlic, sliced
Bay leaves
Oregano
Cumin
Coriander seeds
Black pepper
Red pepper flakes
Cloves (optional)
Allspice (optional)
Salt
About 2 pounds white fish, cut into 1" pieces.
One onion, finely sliced.

Combine all the ingredients except the fish and onion in a saucepan, and boil one minute. Set aside.

Dry the fish thoroughly and sauté quickly in very hot oil until until nicely browned and the fish is just cooked through.

Arrange in a dish in a single layer & cover with one finely sliced onion. Pour the marinade over the top and refrigerate 8 hours, occasionally spooning the marinade over the fish.

Serve with fresh bread or crackers.

What About the Duckworth Dock?

There was discussion at the November 1, 2013 membership meeting about the status of the Duckworth Dock on the Willamette River in downtown Portland. Is it available as temporary tie-up while awaiting a bridge

opening? Would it be a possible destination for a cruise?

This issue came up because we received a letter via CRYA, in which the Portland Bureau of Transportation proposed a new policy limiting tie-ups at the dock to daytime hours only. They requested comment from recreational boaters.

Rusty Gesner reported just before we went to print:

We walked down to and on the Willamette eastside docks today. The fire department dock just north of the Hawthorne Bridge (the green vertical-lift bridge) is signed "Transient Moorage, Maximum Tie-Up Time 1 Hour" and the Duckworth Dock between the Morrison Bridge and the Steel Bridge (the black vertical-lift bridge) is signed "Transient Moorage, Maximum Tie-Up Time 72 Hours, Maximum Size 60 Ft Recreational Vessel." There were a half dozen liveaboard boats tied up there. They seemed like people trying to make the best of tough times, but it would not be a desirable place for a gathering, and there likely wouldn't be enough space anyway. Either dock should be fine for a short tie-up awaiting a bridge lift.


